Woodrow Wilson's inauguration.

19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution: Women's Right to Vote

Passed by Congress June 4, 1919, and ratified on August 18, 1920, the 19th amendment guarantees all American women the right to vote. The National Archives has the official joint resolution from the United States Congress available for viewing on the <u>archives.gov</u> website.



National Museum of American History: Alice Paul Artifacts

The National Museum of American History has a web page that features artifacts from the life of Alice Paul, such as the "jailed for freedom" pin pictured. These items can spark conversation as viewers consider the meaning behind these tangible artifacts of the women's suffrage movement.


